By this time the officials decided the

track was dry enough for the big race of the day, the Cobe race of 200 miles for cars with 600 or less cubic inches piston displacement. Inspectors were placed at various intervals around the track to watch, in case a car stopped for repairs or adjustments, that there be no fouling.
